





## 1. Names of the Parts and their Functions

## **Exterior Features: Front/top View of the Computer**



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

#### 1. Latch

Used to lock the LCD panel to prevent it from opening accidentally. To unlock the LCD panel, slide the knob to the right.

#### 2. LCD Panel

Displays images output by the computer.

#### Critical Point-

- About the properties of LCD screens
  - The phenomena below are inherent in the properties of LCD screens and do not indicate that LCD screens are faulty.
  - The TFT color LCD screen of your computer, composed of more than 2,350,000 picture elements or pixels (Number of dots when the screen resolution is set at 1024 by 768 pixels), was manufactured through the use of high technologies. For technical reasons, your LCD screen may have pixels that do not light and pixels that are always lit, which however does not indicate that your LCD screen is faulty.
  - Colors reproduced by LCD screens for computers vary to some extent from product to product for reasons of manufacture. Also, a slight unevenness of density may show up because of changes in temperature.

#### 3. Power or Sus/Resume button

Used to turn on and off the computer, place it in standby mode and make it resume operation.

#### 4. Keyboard

Used to type characters and enter commands in your computer.

#### 5. Flat Point

Used to control the mouse pointer.

#### 6. One-touch buttons

Used to start programs and control the playback of audio CDs.

#### 7. Operating status indicator LCD

Indicates the operating status of the computer.

The backlight is lit in blue when the computer power on with the AC Adapter attached. Power on with battery, the backlight will not lit.

#### 8. Mode selector

Used to switch the one-touch buttons from one operating mode to another.

#### 9. Speakers

Sound output devices of the computer.

#### 10. Scroll button

Used to scroll up or down through the document in the active window. (Mouse driver must be install for this function.)

#### Critical Point -


 Some applications may not allow you to scroll up and down through a document, using the scroll button.

#### 11. Cover close switch

Places the computer in standby mode and turns off the backlight of the LCD screen when you close the LCD panel, and makes the computer resume operation when you open the LCD panel.

## **Exterior Features: Side Views**

#### Left View of the Computer



#### 1. Modem port

Used to connect the computer to a phone line via the supplied modular cable when using a BBS (online service) or navigating the Internet.

#### 2. Video output terminal (S-terminal)

Used to send S-video signals to the TV connected.

#### 3. IEEE 1394 (DV) port

Used to connect a peripheral device, such as a digital video camera (DVC), to the computer via a DV cable.

#### 4. SD card/Memory stick slot

Used to insert an optional memory card.

#### 5. Antitheft lock

Used to connect a commercially available antitheft cable.

#### 6. DC-IN jack

Used to connect the AC adapter included with your computer.

#### 7. PC card slots


Used to insert optional PC cards.

The upper and lower slots are referred to as Slot 2 and Slot 1, respectively.

Used to turn on and off the wireless LAN device.

Always keep this switch in the OFF position where the use of electronic devices is prohibited, e.g., in hospitals and on airplanes.

#### 6. Infrared Port

This port enables you to make infrared communication

#### 7. USB ports

Used to connect USB-compliant peripheral devices.



Reads and writes data on floppy disks.

#### 9. Optical Disk Drive

Hold either a CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, CD-RW or CD-RW/DVD-ROM drives. Standard optical drive may vary between countries, please check with your local distributor for actual configuration.

## **Exterior Features: Rear/Top View of the Computer**

#### 1. USB ports

Used to connect USB-compliant devices.

Used to connect the computer to a LAN (local area network) via an optional LAN cable for using online service or navigating the Internet.

#### 3. Serial Port

The serial port allows you to connect serial (RS232) devices.

#### 4. Air outlet

Provided to discharge heat from the computer. When you turn on the computer, the cooling fan rotates for a few seconds. When the temperature in the computer rises high, it automatically begins to rotate to discharge heat from the computer.

#### CAUTION-



#### **BREAKAGE**

Do not block the air outlet. Doing so prevents heat from being discharged and could result in damage to your computer.

#### 5. Parallel Port

The parallel port allows you to connect parallel devices.


#### 6. External monitor port

Used to connect an optionally available external monitor.

#### IMPORTANT-

· When connecting an external device to your computer, insert its connector straight into the port with the right side up.



1. SUS/RES indicator ( 1)

Lights when the computer is in operation and blinks when it is on standby.

2. AC adapter indicator (===)

Lights when the computer is powered from the AC adapter.

3. • Battery loading indicator (

Lights when a battery pack is installed in your computer.

Charging status indicator ( )

Lights when the internal battery is being charged.

• Battery life indicator (

Indicates the remaining life of the internal battery pack.

4. CD access indicator ( )

Lights when the CD/DVD drive is being accessed.

Hard disk access indicator (

Lights when the hard disk is being accessed.

#### Critical Point-

- To prevent the corruption of data recorded on the hard disk, do not press the power button when the hard disk access indicator is lit.
- 6. Floppy disk access indicator ( ) Lights when the floppy disk is being accessed.



- To prevent the corruption of data recorded on the floppy disk, do not press the power button when the floppy disk access indicator is lit.
- 7. PC card access indicators ( or 2) Light when a PC card is being accessed.

#### Critical Point-

- [1] lights when the PC card in the lower slot is being accessed, while [2] lights when the PC card in the upper slot is being accessed.
- 8. Num Lock indicator (1)

Lights when the keyboard is locked in Num Lock mode (in which you can use the keyboard as a ten-digit keypad).

To enter or exit Num Lock mode, press the Num Lock key.

9. Caps Lock key (A)

Lights when the keyboard is locked in Caps Lock mode (in which you can enter uppercase letters without pressing and holding down the Shift key).

To enter or exit Caps Lock mode, press the CapsLock key.

10. Scroll Lock indicator ( )

Lights when the active window is locked to prevent it from being scrolled up or down. To enter or exit Scroll Lock mode, press the Numble Lock key while holding down the holding down the reaction of the active window varies from program to program.

#### Names and functions of the principal keys

## 1 Esc (Escape) key

Used to cancel the current task and return to the previous task.

## 2 Function keys

Functions assigned to these keys vary from application to application.

## 3 Num Lk (Numerical Lock) key

Pressing the [Numlk] key activates the ten-key mode. To deactivate the ten-key mode, press it once again.

## 4 Insert / Prt Sc (Print Screen) key

Insert kev

Used to specify whether to overwrite an existing string or to insert a new string.

· Prt Sc (Print Screen) key

Used to save the currently displayed windows as pictorial data (bitmap file). To do so, press the finsertly key while holding the final key down.

To save only the active window as pictorial data, press the [[Insert]] key while holding the [Att] and [[Fn]] keys down.

Using painting software (e.g., Paint), you can edit, save, and print pictorial data. To do so, you need to import it to the painting software by selecting the Paste command from the Edit menu.

#### **5** Delete key

Used to delete the character on the right of the cursor. With this key, you can also delete the file or icon you selected.

By pressing the [Delete] key while holding the [Ctrl] and [Att] keys down, you can forcibly terminate the out-of-control application or computer.

## 6 Pause / Break key

- Pause key
  - Press this key to pause the scree display.
- Break

Its function depend on the application software.

#### 7 Caps Lock key

To use Capital mode, press the [CapsLock] key.

To deactivate the English Capital mode, press these key again.

#### 8 Shift key

Used in combination with other keys. By pressing a key while holding the [Shift] key down, you can enter the character or symbol printed in the upper case of the key.

#### Back Space key

Used to delete the character on the left of the cursor.

## 10 Home key

Press this key to move the cursor directly to the first page of the document or to the head of the row.

## Pg Up and Pg Dn (Page Up and Down key)

Used to display the next page. To do so, press the Pg Up or Pg Dn key.

## 12 Enter key

Used to confirm the string entered.

In text processing, pressing this key inserts a hard return in the text. That's why this key is also called the Return key.

## B End key

Press this key to move the cursor directly to the end of the row or end of the document.

## 1 Ctrl key

Used in combination with other keys.

## **1** FUNCTION KEYS

Your LifeBook notebook has 12 function keys, F1 through F12. The functions assigned to these keys differ for each application.

The [FN] key provides extended functions for the notebook and is always used in conjunction with another key.

- [FN+F3]: Pressing [F3] while holding [FN] will toggle the Audio Mute on and off.
- [Fn+F4]: Pressing [F4] while holding [Fn] will toggle the Quick Point feature on and off. Note that the [Fn+F4] combination only works if Manual Setting is selected in the BIOS.
- [FN+F6]: Pressing [F6] repeatedly while holding [FN] will lower the brightness of your display.\*
- [FN+F7]: Pressing [F7] repeatedly while holding [FN] will increase the brightness of the display.\*
- [FN+F8]: Pressing [F8] repeatedly while holding [FN] will decrease the volume of your LifeBook note-book.\*\*
- [FN+F9]: Pressing [F9] repeatedly while holding [FN] will increase the volume of your LifeBook notebook.\*\*
- [FN+F10]: Pressing [F10] while holding [FN] allows you to change your selection of where to send your display video. Each time you press the combination of keys you will step to the next choice. The choices, in order, are: built-in display panel only, both built-in display panel and external monitor or external monitor only.
- \* There are eight brightness levels.
- \*\* There are 27 audio levels

#### 16 Windows key

Used to open the Start menu.

## Alt key

Used in combination with other keys.

## Application key

Used to open the pop-up menu for the item selected.

This key has the same function as the right button of the Flat Point.

## (19) Cursor keys

Used to move the cursor upward, downward, to right and left.

#### About the ten-key mode


The ten-key mode refers to the mode that enables you to use certain character entry keys as tenkeys (a key arrangement that makes it easy to type in figures). To activate the ten-key mode, simply press the [[Numlk]] key. In the ten-key mode,  $\widehat{\Box}$  is displayed on the status indicator LCD. The figure you can enter with a ten-key is marked on the front surface of the key. Note that connecting an optional ten-key pad disables the ten keys on your computer.



# 3. Using the One-touch Buttons

## **About the One-touch Buttons**

The one-touch buttons enable you to easily invoke various features of your computer. Simply by pressing a one-touch button, you can start an application, check for incoming messages, play back an audio CD, and so on.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

 The mode selector allows you to switch the one-touch buttons from one mode to another, as shown below.

## **Controlling Music Player**

When the mode selector is in the Player position, you can use the one-touch buttons to control Music Player.

When you insert an audio CD into the CD/DVD device while Windows is running, Music Player will automatically start playing the audio CD. To control the playback of the CD you can use the one-touch buttons, Music Player.

#### **IMPORTANT-**

Do not use the one-touch buttons for any type of disc other than audio CDs. Otherwise, the
operation of your computer may become unstable.

#### Critical Point -

For some copy-protected audio CDs, the one-touch buttons may not operate correctly.

## 4. LifeBook Application Panel

One of the unique features of your LifeBook notebook is the LifeBook Application Panel. This panel allows you to operate the Disc Player (applies only to certain models) or launch applications with the touch of a button. (Pseudo-off mode applies only to certain models of LifeBook notebook. Pseudo-off is the mode when Microsoft® Windows® has been shut down but the power switch on the notebook is still in the ON position.)

On some LifeBook notebook models, the panel also allows you to secure your notebook from unauthorized use. Your notebook is pre-installed with software utilities that you use to operate and configure your LifeBook Application Panel. For the Application Panel, go to Start -> Control Panel. The LifeBook Application Panel makes your LifeBook notebook more than just another notebook computer.

#### Critical Point

- For the location of your LifeBook Application Panel please see your User's Guide.
- The Disc Player only works with audio CDs. The Disc Player or launch buttons will work when the Windows operating system in operation.

The panel consists of the following elements:

#### SELECTOR SWITCH

The selector switch allows you to select the function of the one-touch buttons—as an Application Launcher and a Disc Player (if available). The Disc Player is available only on select models; see your LifeBook notebook specifications to determine the configuration of your system.

## **Application Launch Disc Player Buttons**

When the selector switch is in the Application (upper) position, pressing any of the buttons will launch a user-defined application. When the selector switch is in the Disc Player position, the buttons operate as Disc Player.

#### Critical Point

- Certain models may have 4 or 5 buttons. Please refer to your User's Guide for more details.
- The Disc Player features are not available on all models.
- If there is a CD in the player which has finished playing, it will not automatically start playing and will not automatically repeat the CD.

## **E-Mail Notification LED**

By setting up the E-mail LED notification in conjunction with your E-mail button setup, you can connect to your ISP, check for and retrieve new mail, terminate connection and activate the E-mail LED to notify that new mail has arrived.

To use the E-mail LED notification, you must have access to a POP3 Server with no Security Password Authentication. Contact your service provider to determine if they support POP3 without Security Password Authentication.

#### Critical Point-

E-mail Notification LED is available on selected LifeBook notebook models only.

## **Configuring your Lifebook Application Panel**

When you start Windows, the LifeBook Application Panel is automatically activated. As an application launcher, the LifeBook Application Panel is very flexible, giving you a variety of options. To set up the Panel to best suit your needs, we have provided the Application Panel Setup utility that quickly and easily helps you make the most of this valuable feature.

To configure your LifeBook Application Panel with Application Panel Setup:

- 1. Click on Start.
- 2. Click on Control Panel.
- 3. Click on Application Panel.



The Application Panel Setup utility will appear. There are tabs that correspond to the application buttons on the LifeBook Application Panel. When you receive your notebook, these buttons are preconfigured to launch specific applications. For a list of the default applications associated with each button, refer table below.





 The tabs in Application Panel Setup may not be in the same order as the buttons on your LifeBook notebook. Please carefully select the tab you wish to change.


To change an application associated with the Application A, Application B, or E-mail buttons, click on the tab for the button you would like to reconfigure for example, Application A. Click on Specify a programs to start and Application panel wizard pop-up on the screen and you can select either Select a program from start Menu or Specify a programs directly you wish to launch with this button.







The Internet tab is different. It comes to launch your default Windows Internet browser, (Internet Explorer, unless changed.) In order to reconfigure it to launch another program follow these easy steps:

- 1. Select Internet and click on Specify a program to start.
- 2. You can select Start a Program.
- 3. Click or Start a browser and click next. Select a programs from Start Menu or Specify a program directly to select the program you wish to change on the Internet button.







The button will now launch the new application. 

# Critical Point -

 The Internet or E-mail buttons can be configured to launch any application you wish, not just an Internet browser or e-mail program.

### Enabling/disabling Application Launcher button (Selected Models Only)

At the bottom of each application setup page are two selectable options. The first will "Keep this button active even on Standby", and the second will "Keep this button active even on Turn Off. You can enable/disable either or both of these functions simply by check or unchecking the check Box.



#### Critical Point-

• If you choose to have the buttons work when the notebook is in standby or pseudo-off, they will function even if hit accidentally. This will turn on your notebook even if you are not present or using your notebook. This could deplete your battery, and you will need to recharge it before using the notebook.










10. If Dial Up: Click on Dial Up. Choose the Dial up configuration (as previously set in Dial Up Networking) you wish to retrieve mail from. Enter the POP3 Server name, your account name and password for that account. The account name and password should be the same information you entered in the Dial Up configuration. After all the information has been entered, test the connection by clicking on "Verify Connection". If an error occurs, check the settings and information on Dial Up Network and E-mail setting.





# **Using the Disc Player**

The Disc Player enables you to use your notebook's disc drive as an audio Disc Player.

#### Critical Point

- If you shut down from Windows while the Disc Player is playing an audio CD, it will stop. To continue to use the Disc Player, restart the OS. The OS must be operate inorder to play the audio cd using the disc player. The audio CD will start playing at Track 1.
- When you can go into Suspend Mode or Save-to-Disk Mode while the Disc Player is playing a CD. The Disc Player stop playing the Audio. To continue use the Disc Player, press the sus/res button to wake up the system and press play, the audio cd will start playing track1.

There is no configuration required for Disc Player operation. The buttons are pre-configured to work like a normal Disc Player. When the selector switch is in the bottom position, the buttons will operate as follows:

- Stop/Eject: This is the first button to the right of the selector switch. If you press it once, it will stop
  an audio CD that is playing. If you press it twice, it will eject the audio CD. (This option should be
  enable if you wish to use this function from the cd player. By default is disable.)
- Play/Pause: This is the second button to the right of the Stop/Eject button. Press this button to start
  playing an audio CD starting at Track 1. While the audio CD is playing, press it to pause. Press it
  again to continue.
- Back: This button is immediately to the right of the LCD display. Press this button once to skip one track back.
- Forward: This is the second button to the right of the LCD. Press this button once to skip forward one track.

#### Critical Point

If you press the play button and nothing happens, you either have the Mode button switch set
to the Application or, there is no audio CD in the Disc Player, or you have a CD other than an
audio CD in the drive.

# **Desktop Control Panel**


Your LifeBook notebook includes a desktop control panel. You may use this panel to operate the Disc Player when you have the Selector switch to Disc mode.

To use the desktop control panel:

- 1. Click on Start.
- 2. Click on All Programs.
- 3. Click on LifeBook Application Panel.
- 4. Click on CD Player.

The CD Player will appear in the upper left corner of your screen.

To close the panel, click on the "x" button. To minimize the panel, click on the "-" button.




You can select from four appearances for your CD Player. Simply double click on the track display area of the panel and a menu will appear which will allow you to select from a pull down menu. On the CD Players Options menu box, you have an options to select: Always on top, Continuous play and Disable Stop/Eject Button from the CD removal. If you click on "Always on top" the desktop controls will always be seen on your screen, no matter what other application you are running. If you click on "Continuous Play", your Disc Player will automatically start over at the beginning as soon as it finishes the last track. By default the Eject Button is disable from the CD Player Options. Once you press the Eject button, the drive will not eject. If you want the Eject Button to be function, uncheck this options.

You can change the CD Player design by selecting the setting from the pull down menu from the CD Player options by double click on the track display.



Grey (High Color)

You can move the CD Player to anywhere on your desktop. Drag it by clicking on the track number display, holding it down, and dragging the control panel.

When you have placed it where you would like, release the mouse button.

#### Critical Point

- If you have your display set to 256K colors the basic display will appear no matter which one
  you select. You will need to set your display colors to more than 256K in order to select other
  display appearances.
- When you close the Disc Player's desktop control panel, it will stop the audio Disc Player. Simply press the Play button if you would like to continue listening, and the Disc Player will restart at track 1. The Selector switch must be in the Disc Player position.

#### **Precautions**

- LifeBook Application Panel uses the date and time settings of your LifeBook notebook. If the date
  and time are off, you can adjust this setting in the Windows Control Panel.
- If you insert an audio CD which has both audio and data tracks into the Disc Player, the Disc Player may fail to play the first audio track.
- The Volume Up, Volume Down and Mute controls for the Disc Player desktop control panel adjusts
  the volume of the CD audio line only. It does not adjust your notebook's master software volume
  control or the manual volume on the LifeBook notebook.
- The Disc Player desktop control panel is designed to be displayed in High Color (16-bit) or in True Color (24-bit or more). If you have your notebook's display set for 256 colors or less, the Disc Player control panel will display in a "basic" mode.

# 5. Running the Computer on its Battery

# **Recharging the Battery**

1. Connect the AC adapter to your computer.

When you connect the AC adapter to your computer, the AC adapter automatically starts to charge the internal battery pack, and the charging status indicator ( ) and the battery life remaining at that time are displayed on the operating status indicator LCD.

After the charging status indicator has gone off, disconnect the AC adapter from your computer.


### Critical Point

- Recharge the supplied battery pack prior to first using it after purchase or if it is not recharged for more than one month.
- Once the battery has been fully charged, the charging status indicator goes off and the battery life indicator at the left end stops blinking ( ) and goes on ( ). Allow sufficient time for the battery to be fully charged.
- When the battery is 90% or more charged, it cannot be recharged even if the AC adapter is connected. The battery can be recharged when its remaining life is 89% or less.
- The chargeability of the battery degrades when it is used in an extremely hot or cold place.
- When the battery is very hot, for example, immediately after the use of the computer, the battery protection function may be activated to prevent the battery from being recharged. (The charging status indicator blinks.) In such a case, stop charging the battery and wait for a while until the battery temperature comes down.

# **Running the Computer on its Battery**

To run your computer on its internal battery pack, perform these steps.

1. Disconnect the AC adapter from your computer and press the power button.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

### Critical Point

- The battery runs down in a relatively short time when it is used in a cold place.
- The chargeability of the battery degrades over time and its life shortens accordingly after it
  has been used over an extended period of time. If the battery goes dead soon, replace it with
  a new battery.
- A rise in battery temperature may slow down the operation of your computer. If this happens, connect the AC adapter to your computer.

# **Checking the Remaining Battery Life**

The remaining battery life is displayed on the operating status indicator LCD when the battery is being charged or your computer is turned on.

# Indication of the remaining battery life

The remaining battery life is approximately between 100% and 76%.

The remaining battery life is approximately between 75% and 51%.

The remaining battery life is approximately between 50% and 26%.

The remaining battery life is approximately between 25% and 13%.

(During charging, it indicates that the remaining battery life is approximately between 0% and 25%.)

Indicates that the battery is weak (remaining life: 12% or less). 
Indicates that the battery is completely exhausted (remaining life: 0%).

#### Critical Point

- For reasons of lithium-ion battery properties, the battery life indicator may not correctly indicate
  the remaining battery life under some circumstances (temperature conditions, number of
  times the battery has been recharged, and so on).
- When the battery is still 90% or more charged, it cannot be recharged even if you connect the AC adapter to your computer. The battery can be recharged when its remaining life is 89% or less

# Indication of a battery problem

Indicates that the battery cannot be charged for some reason or other.

### Critical Point

 If is displayed, turn off your computer, remove and install the battery all over again. If this persists, your might have to replace the battery pack with a new one because it is most likely defective.

### Low battery condition

When the battery is discharged to a critically low level, the battery life indicator on the operating status indicator LCD blinks ( ). If it blinks, connect the AC adapter to your computer to recharge the battery.

#### Critical Point -

- The use of a weak battery could result in the lost of data you are currently working with or saving. When the battery runs low, connect the AC adapter to your computer as soon as possible, or if no AC adapter is available, immediately save the data you are working with, exit all programs and turn off your computer.
- Reading or writing data on the hard disk requires a large amount of electrical power. Therefore, when the battery is weak, connect the AC adapter to your computer before reading or writing data on the hard disk.
- Leaving the battery weak for a certain period of time causes the computer to automatically go into standby mode. When data is being read or written on the hard disk, however, the computer will not go into standby mode before the data reading or writing process is complete.
- By default, your computer is set so that it will go into standby mode when the battery life reaches about 3%.

To change this setting, follow these steps: Open the Power Options Properties dialog box, click the Alarms tab, and then click "Set off low battery alarm when power level reaches" in the Low battery alarm section to activate this option ( changes to ).

Note that changing this setting causes your computer to shut down as soon as the battery goes dead, and could result in the lost of data not saved or could make your computer unstable.

# **Cautions in Using the Battery Pack**





#### **ELECTRIC SHOCK**

The battery pack is shock-sensitive. To avoid damage due to shock, be careful not to
drop the battery pack when installing or removing it. For safety's sake, do not use a
battery once it has been shocked. The use of a damaged battery could result in an
electric shock or explosion.

### Do not take the battery apart.

Taking the battery apart or touching its internal components could result in an electric shock or fire.

# Electrical discharge

- It is good practice to always recharge the battery before use since it is discharged spontaneously.
- When you know you will not use the computer for a long period of time (for one month or more), remove the battery pack from your computer and keep it in a cool place. Leaving the battery in the computer without recharging for a long period of time causes it to be discharged excessively and shortens its useful life.

### Useful life of the battery

- The battery runs down and deteriorates over time even if it is not used. To check the battery condition, Eherefore, you should run your computer on its internal battery at least once a month.
- Leaving the battery in a hot place causes it to go dead and deteriorate in a short time.
- The battery pack is consumable and its chargeability degrades gradually over time. When the battery has reached the end of its useful life, replace it with a new one.
- When the battery is approaching the end of its useful life, it goes dead in a very short time.
- When the battery has reached the end of its useful life, remove it from the computer. Leaving it in the computer could result in an electric shock or fire.

### Disposal of the battery pack

 Before disposing of the battery pack, take measures to prevent it from shorting, for example, sealing its connector with an insulating tape. After removing the internal battery pack, do not mix it with other batteries.

The internal battery pack (lithium-ion battery) contains precious resources. Therefore, you should dispose of the disused battery pack as a recyclable material whenever possible.

For the recycling of batteries, see Recycling of batteries. (To see Recycling of batteries, select Setting up the computer, Appendixes, and Recycling of batteries.)

# Battery life

- The energy-saving features of your computer help you conserve battery power.
- Battery life greatly varies according to the ambient temperature. The life of a battery may shorten when it is used in a cold place.

#### You should power your computer from the AC adapter when:

- Using a online service or navigating the Internet,
- Using the hard disk or DVD/CD drive frequently,
- · Connecting to a LAN,
- · Restoring the computer to its original state,
- Connecting two or more external devices, such as PC cards and USB devices, to your computer at the same time.

# **Changing the Internal Battery Pack**

#### **ELECTRIC SHOCK**


Be sure to turn off your computer before changing the internal battery pack. To avoid shock hazards and damage to your computer, be careful not to touch internal components of the computer, including the battery connector.

- 1. Turn off your computer.
- 2. Close the LCD panel, and place your computer upside down.

#### IMPORTANT -

- · Close the LCD panel gently to avoid damage due to shock. Failure to do so could result in damage to the LCD panel.
- 3. Remove the battery pack while pressing the lugs in the direction of the arrow.


The internal battery pack is disengaged from the connector.

### 4. Install a new battery pack.

With the slits in the battery pack aligned with the projections on the computer, place the battery pack in the battery bay and push it down until it clicks into place.



# Critical Point -

- After removing the internal battery pack, take measures to prevent it from shorting, for example, sealing its connector with an insulating tape. After removing the battery pack, do not mix it with other batteries.
- The internal battery pack (lithium-ion battery) contains precious resources. Therefore, you should dispose of the disused battery pack as a recyclable material whenever possible.

# 6. Using the Optical Disk Drive

In this manual, CD-ROMs, audio CDs and CD-R/RW discs are collectively referred to as CDs, and DVD-ROMs and DVD-Videos as DVDs. Also, CDs and DVDs are sometimes referred to simply as discs.



# CAUTION-



#### INJURY

When inserting or removing a CD or DVD, be careful not to catch your finger in the tray to avoid possible injury to your finger.

# Cautions in Using CD/DVDs

Take the following precautions when handling CDs and DVDs.

- · Handle discs with care so that they are free from fingerprints, dust and flaws.
  - Fingerprints, dust and flaws on a disc could prevent information from being read from it or being written/rewritten on it correctly. Also, they could prevent audio CDs and DVD-Videos from being played back normally.
- Do not stick any label to a disc or do not write anything on it with a pencil or ballpoint pen.
- Be careful not to spill coffee or any other liquid on a disc.
- · When a disc is dirty or wet, wipe it outward from the center with a slightly moistened cloth, and then with a dry cloth.
  - Do not dry it with a hairdryer or do not let it dry itself.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, water, record cleaner, antistatic agent, or a silicone cloth to clean
- · Keep discs in their cases whenever they are not in use.
- Do not bend a disc or do not put a heavy object on top of it.
- Do not keep discs in a hot or cold place.

#### IMPORTANT -

 Most publications, including music and videos, are protected by copyright. You are not allowed to record or copy such publications (including the conversion of data formats) for any purpose. If you want to use sound and video files for any purpose other than the above, e.g., delivering them over a network, you have to obtain prior consent from the copyright holder.

- Use round CD/DVDs but not CD/DVDs of any irregular form (e.g., star-shaped or card type CD/DVDs).
  - CD/DVDs of irregular form could prevent your CD/DVD drive from reading or writing data correctly, or could result in damage to your drive.
- Some copy-protected audio CDs may not be played back on your CD/DVD drive.
- Dropouts may occur during the playback of an audio CD. If they occur, follow the steps below
  to switch to analog play mode. Note that, in analog play mode, no audio files can be recorded
  directly on the MD recorder connected to the optical digital output terminal on your computer.

- 1. Click the Start button and select Control Panel.
- 2. Click Performance and Maintenance, and then System.
- 3. Click the Hardware tab and select Device manager.
- 5. On the Properties page, click "Enable this CD-ROM device to play digital audio CDs" to deactivate it ( changes to ), and then click OK.

When you are using Media Player to play audio CDs, perform the steps below, too.

- 6. Start Media Player.
- 7. Click Tools, then Options.
- On the Devices page, make sure that the DVD/CD-RW drive is selected, and then click Properties.
- 9. Click the option button for Analog under Playback and then click OK.
- 10. Click OK in the Options window.
- 11. Restart your computer.

### Critical Point -

- The region code of your computer is [3] by default. Region codes are assigned to DVD-Videos on a country-by-country basis. DVD-Videos with a region code other than [3] may not be played back on your CD/DVD drive.
- Some DVDs are protected from unauthorized copying. For copyright protection, your computer
  has descramble and authentication functions. So, if attempt is made to play an audio or
  video file copied from a copy-protected disc, an authentication error will occur to stop if from
  being played back.


# Inserting a Disc

### IMPORTANT-

- When accessing the CD/DVD drive frequently or playing a DVD-Video, you should power your computer from the AC adapter.
- When inserting a disc, fit the hole in the disk on the stopper at the center of the tray, and push
  it down until it clicks into place.
  - Failure to do so may cause the disc to come off and damage the tray or the disc itself.
- When a self-starting disc is loaded in the CD/DVD drive, do not place the computer into standby (pause) mode.
  - Otherwise, the disk will start twice when the computer resumes operation, and may cause the computer to malfunction. If the disc starts twice, exit all programs started from it, and eject and load the disc again.
- CDs and DVDs sometimes vibrate and whistle, because they rotate at very high speeds when
  data is being read from them.

# 1. Press the CD eject button.

The tray springs out a little.

# 2. Pull out the tray gently.




### Critical Point\_

- If the tray will not comes out
   If the computer is turned off, turn it on, and then press the CD eject button.

# 3. Place a disc on the tray while holding the tray with a hand.

Fit the hole in the disc on the stopper at the center of the tray with the title-printed face up, and push it down until it clicks into place. Failure to do so may make it impossible to play or eject the CD.




# Critical Point

• When inserting a disc, fit the hole in the disc on the stopper at the center of the tray to prevent the disc from coming off and hitting against the computer main unit.

# 4. Push the tray gently into the drive.

It is about 10 seconds before the CD gets ready for use.




### Critical Point

- Multi-session discs may take a little longer to start than other types of discs.
- When you insert an audio CD while Windows is running, Windows Media Player may automatically start and play the CD. You can use either Media Player or the one-touch buttons to control the playback of the CD.





- If this does not work well, perform these steps.
  - 1. Turn off your computer.
  - 2. Insert a straightened paperclip, and the like, into the pinhole by the side of the CD eject button.




# IMPORTANT-

If a rosette type phone jack is used, it needs be changed to a modular type.
 Changing a phone jack from rosette type to modular type must be done by an authorized technician or under his or her supervision. So, if you need to change the phone jack, you will have to ask your local office or branch.



Plug the modular cable from your computer in the phone jack on the wall.
 Insert the other end of the modular cable from your computer into the modular type phone jack.



### Critical Point

- Your telephone cannot be used when its modular cable is disconnected. So, do not forget to plug it again after using the built-in modem.
- If you run the modular cable close to a household electrical appliance or tie it in a bundle, a communications error could occur.
- If the supplied modular cable is too short to connect your computer to the phone jack on the wall, use a commercially available modular cable instead. Note that the use of a long modular cable could result in a reduction in the data transfer rate or a communication error.

### IMPORTANT-

 If you navigate the Internet for a long time while leaving programs active, a heavy load is applied to the CPU of your computer and communications via the built-in modem may be broken unexpectedly. If this happens, exit all running programs other than the Web browser and e-mail program before connecting to the Internet again.

# Using a LAN

#### Preparing necessary items

LAN cable	There are two types of LAN cables: straight type and cross type. Select a cable appropriate to the data transfer rate of the network you want to use.
Network connection device	Prepare a device that serves your purpose of connecting to a LAN.  Here are some examples of network connection devices.  • Dialup router  • Cable modem  • ADSL modem  • Hub



- 3. Connect the LAN cable to the network connection device.
- 4. Plug the LAN cable in the network device.

Plug the other end of the cable connected in step 2 in the port on the network connection device, and turn on the network connection device.

- 5. Connect the AC adapter to the computer and turn on the computer.
- 6. Click the Start button and select Control Panel.
- 7. Click Performance and Maintenance, then Power Options.
- 8. On the Power Schemes page, set the items below, and click OK when you are through.
  - System standby: Never
  - System hibernates: Never

These settings prevent Windows from automatically placing your computer into standby or hibernation mode.

### IMPORTANT-

- When you are connected to a network (such as the Internet), do not place your computer into standby or hibernation mode, otherwise your computer may not maintain connection with the network.
  - Whenever your computer is not in use, it should be turned off.
- When you want to connect to an existing network, ask the network administrator what and how
  you should set up.

#### Critical Point

- When disconnecting the LAN cable from your computer, pull out the connector while holding down the stopper on it, otherwise the connector could be broken.
- When connecting to a LAN, you should power your computer from the AC adapter whenever possible, since data transfer over a network requires a large amount of electrical power.

# 9. About the Integrated Wireless Lan (For selected model)

# **Before Using This Device**

Thank you for purchasing a Fujitsu LifeBook with an Integrated Wireless LAN. This manual describes the basic operating procedures for the Wireless LAN (referred to as the "device" in this manual) and how to set up a wireless LAN network. Before using this device, read this manual carefully to ensure correct operation of the device. Keep this manual in a safe place for reference while using the device.

#### Characteristics of the Device

This device consists of a wireless LAN card that is attached to the computer via a mini-PCI slot. The main characteristics are as follows:

- It uses the power saving communications system in the 2.4 GHz band, and does not require any license for radio communication.
- It uses Direct Sequence Spread Spectrum (DS-SS), which is resistant to noise.
- The Wireless LAN Mini-PCI module complies with Wi-Fi, and is able to communicate at the maximum transfer rate of 11 Mbps.
- The maximum communication range is approximately 80 feet (25 meters) inside a building. The
  range may be shorter depending upon the installation factors, such as walls and columns.
- Unauthorized access can be prevented with the use of SSID and encryption key.

# **Wireless Lan Modes**

# Using This Device

#### AdHoc Mode

The "AdHoc Mode" refers to the network connecting two computers using wireless LAN cards. This connection is called an "AdHoc network."

Using an AdHoc network, you can obtain a network connection easily and at a low cost.

In the AdHoc mode, you can use the function supported by Microsoft Network, such as File and Print Sharing to exchange files and share a printer or other peripheral devices.

To use the AdHoc Mode, you must set the same SSID and the same encryption key for all the computers that are connected. All connected computers can communicate.

#### Infrastructure Mode

If a number of computers are connected simultaneously in the AdHoc mode, the transfer rate may be reduced, communications may become unstable, or the network connection could fail. This is because all wireless LAN cards are using the same radio frequency in the network.

To improve this situation, you can use a wireless LAN access point, which is sold separately. The wireless LAN network is in the "Infrastructure mode" when it uses an access point, and such a connection is called the "Infrastructure Network."

By using an access point, you can set and use a different communication channel for each network group. Each channel is given a different radio frequency, and it eliminates the collision of communications and provides a more stable communications environment.

Infrastructure mode is most suitable when you are configuring multiple wireless LAN networks on the same floor. To connect a wireless LAN network to a wired LAN, you need an access point.

### How to Handle This Device

The Integrated Wireless LAN device is already installed in your LifeBook computer. Under normal circumstances, it should not be necessary for you to remove or re-install it. The LAN has been configured to support the operating system with which your system shipped.

# **Connecting Windows 2000 Systems**

This chapter describes how to set the wireless LAN connection for computers running Windows 2000.

# **Critical Point-**

 When you receive your LifeBook, the integrated wireless LAN device and drivers have already been installed. This procedure outlines the steps for setting the device parameters.

# Workflow

The proper setup of the wireless LAN requires several steps which must be performed in the proper order. Following is a general outline of the steps that must be performed. Each step is detailed later in this procedure.

- 1. Setting parameters
  - · Setting the profile
  - · Setting the encryption
- 2. Network settings
  - · Setting the protocol and checking the network
  - · Setting file and printer sharing
  - · Checking the connection

# **Setting Parameters**

- 1 Click [Start] → [Settings] → [Control Panel].
- 2 Double-click the [PRISM Settings] icon. The [PRISM Wireless Settings] appears.
- 3 Set the profile as specified in Table 1. Ask your network administrators to check the setting.
- 4 When you finish your entry, click [Apply].

Item	Description
Profile	Enter the system file name in which the parameter information is to be saved.
Mode	Ad Hoc Network: Click the down arrow and select "802.11 AdHoc".  Infrastructure Network: Click the down arrow and select "Infrastructure".
SSID	Enter the network name to which you want to connect.
Transmit Rate	Obtain the information from your network administrator. If you do not have a network administrator, select "Fully Automatic".
Power Save Enabled	Not supported.
AdHoc Channel	AdHoc Network: Select the same channel, 1-13, for all connected computers. If there is more than one wireless LAN nearby (such as on the same floor), we recommend that the channels for each LAN be 5 numbers apart (e.g., if there are two other LANs nearby, the channels used should be 1, 6, and 11). Infrastructure Network: Not an option.

5 Click the [Encryption] tab.

# 6 Set the encryption items in accordance with Table 2.

- AdHoc Network: Specify the same value for all the computers for which the encryption key is
  used for connection.
- Infrastructure Network: Specify the identical encryption keys to the encryption keys set for the access point. For instructions on how to check the encryption keys set for the access point, refer to the access point manual.

# Critical Point-

Make sure that you specify the encryption keys. If you do not specify the keys, any computer
with a wireless LAN card can be connected. This presents a risk that your data may be
stolen or destroyed.

Encryption (WEP)	Click the down arrow and select an encryption option.
	Disable: Disables the encryption. In this case, "Create keys with Passphrase" and subsequent items are greyed out, and you cannot enter anything.

#### Critical Point -

 When you are using ADSL (PPPoE) with the infrastructure network to connect to the Internet, you need to change the MTU size set for the computer. To change the MTU size, refer to the manual that comes with the access point.

# **Network Connection**

The section describes how to set the network connection for a computer with Windows 2000.

# Network Settings

In this section, you set "TCP/IP Settings," and complete

- 1 Double-click the [Network and Dial-up Connections] icon. The [Network and Dial-up Connections] window appears.
- 2 Right click the [Local Area Connection], then click [Properties] from the menu that appears. The [Local Area Connection Properties] window appears.

#### Critical Point

- More than one network adapter is installed in your system if more than one [Local Area Connection] entry is displayed. In this case, select the [Local Area Connection] entry with [Intersil PRISM Wireless LAN PCI Card] displayed under [Device Name].
- 3 Perform the following steps.
  - Click [Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)].
  - Click [Properties]. The [Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) Properties] window appears.

4 Set an IP address as indicated in Table 7. Ask your network administrator to check the setting.

### Sharing

In this section, you set sharing of the drive, folder, and printer.

You only need to set this when you are sharing files or a printer with other computers on the network.

When you share a drive, folder, or printer, you can use them from any computer on the network.

- Setting [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks]
- 1 Click [Start]  $\rightarrow$  [Settings]  $\rightarrow$  [Control Panel].
- 2 Double-click the [Network and Dial-up Connections] icon. The [Network and Dial-up Connections] windows appears.
- 3 Right click the [Local Area Connection], then click [Properties] from the menu that appears. [Local Area Connection Properties] appears.

### Critical Point-

- More than one network adapter is installed in your system if more than one [Local Area Connection] entry.
- 4 If [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is displayed in the list, make sure that it is checked. If it is not checked, check it and click [OK]. You do not have to perform the following steps. Go to the next section, entitled "Sharing Files."

If [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is not found in the list, click [Install], and perform Step 5 and subsequent steps. When you click [Install], the [Select Network Component Type] window appears.

- 5 Perform the following steps.
  - Click [Service].
  - Click [Add]. The [Select Network Service] window appears.
- 6 Perform the following steps.
  - Click [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks].
  - Click [OK]. You will go back to [Local Area Connection Properties], and [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is added to the list.
- 7 Click [OK].

### Critical Point-

If you have changed the setting, [Close] is shown instead. Click [Close].

### Sharing Files

4 Click [OK]. The printer sharing is set, and the icon changes.

### **Checking the Connection**

After the network setting is completed, access the shared drive on another computer to check the connectivity of the wireless LAN network.

### Accessing Another Computer

# **Connecting Windows XP Systems**

This chapter describes how to set up the wireless LAN connection for computers that are running Windows XP.

### **Critical Point-**

 When you receive your LifeBook, the integrated wireless LAN device and drivers have already been installed. This procedure outlines the steps for setting the device parameters.

### Workflow

The proper setup of the wireless LAN connection requires that several steps be performed in the proper order. Following is a general outline of the steps to be performed. Each step is detailed later in this procedure.

### 1 Setting parameters

- · Setting the profile
- Setting the encryption

### 2 Network settings

- Setting the protocol and checking the network
- Setting file and printer sharing
- · Checking the connection

### **Setting Parameters**

- 1 Click [Start] → [Control Panel].
- 2 Click [Network and Internet connection].
- 3 Click [Network connection]. A list of networks that are currently installed is displayed.
- 4 Right click [Intersil PRISM Wireless LAN PCI Card] in the list, and click [Properties] from the menu that is displayed. [Wireless Network Connection 2 Properties] appears.
- 5 Click the [Wireless Networks] tab. The [Wireless Networks] tab appears.

### 6 Perform the following steps.

- Make sure that [Use Windows to configure my wireless network settings] is checked.
- Click [Add] under [Preferred networks]. [Wireless Network Properties] appears.

#### 7 Set parameters.

- For the AdHoc network, specify the same value to all the computers, for which the encryption
  key is used for connection.
- For the infrastructure network, specify the encryption key (network key) with the same value
  to the encryption key of the access point. For how to check the encryption keys set for the
  access point, refer to the manual supplied with the access point.

### Critical Point

Be sure to specify the encryption keys. If you do not specify the keys, any computer with a
wireless LAN card can be connected. This presents a risk that other users may steal or
destroy your data.

In this section, you set "TCP/IP Settings," and complete "Checking Computer Name and Workgroup" required for the network connection.

• If [Wireless Network Connection 2 Properties] is not displayed, click [Start] → [Settings] → [Control Panel], and double-click the [Network Connection] icon.

- Click [Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)].

### **Sharing**

In this section, you set sharing of the drive, folder, and printer.

You need to set this only when you are sharing files or a printer with other computers on the network.

When you share a drive, folder, or printer, you can use these from any computer on the network.

- Setting [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks]
- 1 Click [Start] → [Control Panel]. Make sure the Classic View is selected.
- 2 Double-click the [Network Connection] icon. Make sure that it is checked. If it is not checked, check it, and click [OK]. You do not have to perform the following steps. Go to the next section, "Sharing Files."
- 3 If [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is not found in the list, click [Install], and perform Step 5 and the subsequent steps.
- 4 When you click [Install], [Select Network Component Type] appears.
- 5 Perform the following steps.
  - Click [Service].
  - Click [Add]. [Select Network Service] appears.
- 6 Perform the following steps.
  - Click [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks].
  - Click [OK]. You will go back to [Wireless Network Connection 2 Properties], and [File and Printer Sharing for Microsoft Networks] is added to the list.
- 7 Click [Close].

### Sharing Files

The following example shows how to set sharing the "Work" folder on the c: drive.

- 1 Click [Start] → [My Computer].
- 2 Double-click the [Local Disk (c:)] icon.
- 3 Right click the "Work" folder, and then click [Sharing and Security] from the menu that appears. [Work Properties] appears.
- 4 Click [If you understand the security risks but want to share files without running the wizard, click here].

#### Critical Point-

 If you have already clicked [If you understand the security risks but want to share files without running the wizard, click here], this window does not appear.

In the [Work Properties] window, the description under [Network Sharing and security] changes.

- 5 Check [Share this folder on the network].
  Uncheck [Allow network users to change my files], if the shared folder is for read only.
- 6 Click [OK]. The folder is set shared, and the "Work" folder icon changes.
- Printer Sharing
- 1 Right-click the printer to be shared, and click [Sharing] from the menu that appears. The properties of the printer to be shared will be displayed. Set printer sharing.
  On the display, the printer sharing setting is recommended by the Network Setup Wizard, but for the wireless LAN network, security is maintained by network name (SSID) or network key. The following steps allow you to set up printer sharing without using the Network Setup Wizard.
- 2 Click OK. If you understand the security risks but want to share printers without running the wizard, click here. 'Enable Printer Sharing' will be displayed.
- 3 Select 'Just enable printer sharing'.
- 4 Click 'OK'. The printer properties will be indicated.
- 5 Select 'Share this printer'.
- 6 Enter the sharing printer name in 'Share name'.
- 7 Click OK. The printer will be shared, and the printer icon will become a sharing icon.

### **Checking the Connection**

After the network setting is completed, access the shared drive on another computer to check the connectivity of the wireless LAN network.

- 2 From the left menu in [Other Places], click [My Network Places].
- 3 From the left menu in [Network Tasks], click [View workgroup computers]. The workgroup in which you are participating will appear.
- 4 Double click the computer to which you want to connect. The drive that you set in [Computer Sharing] appears.
- 5 Double click the drive to which you want to connect. The contents of the drive will appear, and is available for use.
- Checking the Connectivity
- 1 Click [Start] → [Control Panel].
- 2 Double-click the [PRISM Settings] icon. [PRISM Wireless Setting] appears.
- 3 Check the connectivity on the [Link] tab. The current condition of connection is displayed

# 1. Using a PC Card

### Cautions in Using a PC Card

### ⚠ CAUTION—



#### BREAKAGE

A PC card is composed of static-sensitive parts, and it is easily broken by static discharged from a human body. Before touching a PC card, always touch an appropriate metal object to discharge static from your body.

To avoid damage, take the following precautions when using PC cards.

- . Do not place PC cards in a hot place or where they will be exposed to direct sunlight.
- · Be careful not to shock PC cards
- · Do not put a heavy object on top of a PC card.
- · Be careful not to spill coffee or any other liquid on a PC card.
- · Keep PC cards in their cases whenever they are not in use.

### Supported PC Cards

Your computer supports PC Card Standard-compliant Type I, Type II and Type III PC cards, which include, for example, the following:

#### SCSI Card

This type of PC card is needed to connect a storage device, such as an SCSI-compliant hard disk or MO (magneto-optical) drive, to your computer.

### Critical Point-

- Two PC cards may not be used at the same time with your computer, depending on the type
  of PC card used. For more information, refer to the documentation supplied with your PC
  card.
- Your computer does not support PC cards with a rated voltage of 12V.
- Some types of PC cards cannot be inserted in the upper PC card slot.

### **Preparing Necessary Items**

PC Card	Prepare a PC card that meets your needs.
PC Card driver	Some PC cards come with a CD or floppy disk that contains their respective drivers.
Instruction Manual for PC card	Setup procedures vary from PC card to PC card. So, read the documentation supplied with your PC card before starting its setup.


When inserting a PC card into a PC card slot, be careful not to put your finger into the slot, otherwise you could injure your finger.

### Critical Point -

- Before using a PC card, you might need to turn off your computer or to install the device driver, depending on the type of PC card used.
- When your computer is loaded with two PC cards, it should be powered from the AC adapter to prevent the deterioration of the internal battery pack.

### 1. Install a PC card.

Insert the PC card as far as it will go with the labeled face up.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

2. If necessary, install the driver before inserting the card for the first time.

Some PC cards require no driver to be installed. If necessary, however, install the driver for your PC card according to the instructions in its manual.

To install a driver, you might need a CD or floppy disk that contains it.

3. Make sure that (remove hardware safely) is displayed in the notification area in the bottomright corner of the screen.

If this icon is not displayed, eject the PC card by performing steps 3 and 4 in the Removing a PC card section, and then insert it again.

### Critical Point-

 For PC cards with a cord, do not put an object on top of the connector connecting the cord to the PC card to avoid damage to the connected.

### Removing a PC Card

Here is the explanation of how to remove a PC card.

### Critical Point -

- When removing a PC card with a cord, do not pull its cord to avoid damage to it.
- To remove a PC card when your computer is turned on, always follow the steps below. Failure to do so could damage your computer or PC card.
- Some PC cards cannot be removed when the computer is running. To check whether your PC card is of this type or not, read your PC card manual carefully before use.



### CAUTION-



#### HOT

A PC card may be hot immediately after use. When removing a PC card, do not pull out the PC card immediately after use but wait for a while after you are through step 3, otherwise you could burn your fingers.



#### **INJURY**

When removing a PC card, be careful not to put your finger into the PC card slot. otherwise you could injure your finger.

1. Click (remove hardware safely) in the notification area in the bottom-right corner of the screen.

### Critical Point

 Remove a PC card by performing these steps: double-click (remove hardware safely) in the notification area in the bottom-right corner of the screen and click Stop in the Remove Hardware ≤ dialog box that appears.

Otherwise, the operation of your computer may become unstable.


2. Click "Remove the XXX safely"

XXX denotes the name of the PC card used.

### Critical Point

 If a message appears, telling you that the device should be stopped later because the device general-purpose volume is not ready to stop, click OK, check to be sure that the PC card you want to remove is not being accessed, and then perform steps 1 and 2 over again.



### **Installing Memory**

### **⚠ WARNING** —



### **ELECTRIC SHOCK**

When installing or removing memory, be sure to turn off your computer and disconnect the AC adapter from it to avoid shock hazards.



#### **SWALLOWING**

Keep small objects, such as a cover, caps and screws, out of the reach of babies and children to avoid the danger of suffocation.

In case a baby or child has swallowed such an object, consult the doctor immediately.





#### HOT

Some components around the memory slot are very hot immediately after use. To avoid burns, do not install or remove memory immediately after turning off the computer but wait for a while until its internal components cool down.



#### **BREAKAGE**

When installing or removing memory, hold its edge so as not to touch any terminal or IC. Also, be careful not to touch internal components or terminals of the computer. Touching these parts with oily fingers could result in poor electrical contact.

When installing or removing memory, be sure to turn off your computer. If you install or remove memory with the computer placed in standby or hibernation mode, data not saved could be lost or the computer or memory could be broken.


### Critical Point-

- To avoid damage, do not to touch internal components unnecessarily.
- To avoid damage, be careful not to drop small objects removed, such as screws, into the computer.
- 1. Turn off your computer and disconnect the AC adapter from it.
- 2. Slide the cover to the left to remove it.



### Lift the lugs on the keyboard in the direction of the arrow, and pull it gently toward the LCD panel.




### 4. Lift the keyboard gently to open it.




### 5. Install memory.

  - 2. Click the Start button and select Control Panel.


The Control Panel window is displayed.

3. Click Performance and Maintenance, and then System.

The System Properties dialog box is displayed.

Check whether the circled numeric value in the figure below has increased by the size of the memory you have added.

In this example, 256 MB of memory on the system.

The memory capacity displayed may be 64 MB less than the actual memory capacity, depend how much memory you allocate from the BIOS for the Video memory. You either can select 16MB,32MB or 64MB for the Video memory.

#### 5. Click OK.

The Performance and Maintenance window appears again.

 If the numeric value displayed does not agree with the memory capacity of your computer, check to see if the memory is installed properly.


# **Changing Memory**




### 5. Remove the memory.

Remove the cover of the memory slot and remove the hook on each side from the memory module. The memory comes up slightly. Then, pull the memory diagonally up to remove it from the slot.




### 6. Install a new memory module.

### 7. Close the keyboard gently.

Close the keyboard with the lugs on it aligned with the lugs on the computer main unit. At that time, be careful that no cable gets caught between the keyboard and the computer main unit.



### 8. Attach the cover removed in step 2.



### **Critical Point-**

 After you have changed memory, check the memory capacity of you computer to be sure that the memory is installed properly.

# 3. Using a Memory Card

### **Supported Memory Cards**

The SD card/Memory stick slot directly reads and writes data recorded on memory cards designed for portable digital devices, such as digital cameras.

The SD card/Memory stick slot of your computer supports two types of memory cards (only one card can be used at a time), so that you do not need to purchase an adapter for each type of memory card.

### **Inserting a Memory Card**


### **IMPORTANT-**

- For the handling of your memory card and data recorded on it, refer to the documentation supplied with your memory card and the peripheral device used with it.
- Do not use Windows XP to format memory cards that are used with a digital camera, and so on. Formatting such memory cards, using Windows XP, make it impossible for them to be used with the digital camera.

If you have formatted such memory cards, using Windows XP, reformat them using your digital camera. For the method of formatting memory cards, refer to the documentation supplied with your digital camera.

### 1. Inset a memory card into the SD card/Memory stick slot.

Push it in until it clicks into place.



If a message appears, asking "What do you want Windows to do?" each time you insert the SD card/Memory stick into the slot, there is a few options for you to select: Play using Media Player, Open folder to view files using Windows Explorer or Take no action. Just select which options you prefer.


### Removing a Memory Card

### **IMPORTANT-**

• For the handling of your memory card and data recorded on it, refer to the documentation supplied with your memory card and the peripheral device used with it.

### 1. Remove the memory card from your computer.

Push in the memory card once to have it spring out, then pull it out of the slot.



### IMPORTANT:

 When removing the memory card from the SD card/Memory card slot, do not twist or pull it diagonally to avoid applying unnecessary force to the card.

# 4. Connecting a USB Device

# Preparing Necessary Items

USB device	Devices that can be plugged in USB ports on your computer. Prepare USB devices that meet your needs.  • Digital camera  • Mouse  • Printer  • Scanner  • Keyboard
USB cable	Used to connect a USB device to your computer. Some USB devices come standard with a cable as separate part, and others come with a cable already connected like a mouse.  For more information, refer to the documentation supplied with the your USB device.
USB device driver	Some USB devices come with a CD or floppy disk containing their respective drivers. If necessary, install a Windows-compatible driver according to the instructions in your USB device manual.
Manual for USB device	Ways of connecting cables vary from USB device to USB device.  Before connecting a USB device for the first time, read its manual carefully.


### **Critical Point-**

- Each USB port on your computer is capable of supplying the USB device connected with power of up to 500 mA. For more information, refer to the documentation supplied with your USB device.
- When connecting two or more USB devices to your computer at the same time, you should power the computer from the AC adapter to prevent degradation in battery performance.

### Connecting a USB Device

- 1. Plug a USB cable in the connector of your USB device.
- 2. Plug the cable from the USB device in a USB port on the computer.

  Insert the connector with the face marked with facing to the right.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

3. Install the driver.

Some USB devices require no driver to be installed. For information about this, refer to the documentation supplied with your USB device.


### **Critical Point-**

 If the Install Hardware dialog box appears when you connect the USB cable, click Continue to continue the installation of the driver.

### **Connecting a USB Mouse**

1. Plug the USB mouse in the mouse port on the back of your computer.

Insert the connector with the face amarked with facing to the right.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

### Critical Point-

- A USB mouse can be connected to and disconnected from your computer at any time without shutting down the computer.
- Connecting a USB mouse does not automatically disable Flat Point. If you want to disable Flat Point, see "Disabling Flat Point."

### **Disabling Flat Point**

Connecting a USB mouse enables you to use two pointing devices at the same time: USB mouse and Flat Point. However, if you want to use only the mouse, follow these steps to disable Flat Point.

Press the key while holding down the key.
 Each time you press the F4 key. Flat Point is switched back and force between on and off.

The message "Internet pointing device: Enable" is displayed when Flat Point is enabled, while the message "Internet pointing device: Disable" is displayed when it is disabled.

### IMPORTANT-

· Before disabling Flat Point, be sure to connect a USB mouse to your computer.

### Critical Point-

Even though Flat Point is disabled by pressing the fin and f4 keys at the same time, it will be enabled automatically when your computer is restarted or when it resumes operation. If you want to disable Flat Point again, press the f4 key again while holding down the fin key.

# 5. Connecting an External Monitor

## Preparing Necessary Items

External monitor	Your computer supports PC/AT-compatible and DOS/V-compatible monitors.
Monitor cable	Used to connect an external monitor to your computer. Most external monitors come with this cable, as a separate part for some monitors and already connected for others.  If this cable is not included with your monitor or it cannot be plugged in the external monitor port of your computer, prepare a PC/AT-compatible or DOS/V-compatible monitor cable with a connector that fits the external monitor port of your computer.
Instruction manual for your external monitor	Ways of connecting cables vary from monitor to monitor. For the way of connecting your monitor, therefore, refer to the documentation supplied with it.

### **Connecting an External Monitor**

This section explains how to connect a CRT monitor to your computer via the external monitor port on its back.



### ⚠ WARNING —



### **ELECTRIC SHOCK**

Before connecting or disconnecting an external monitor, always turn off your computer and disconnect the AC adapter from it to avoid shock hazards.


#### **BREAKAGE**

Connect cables correctly according to the instructions in this manual. Incorrect connection of the cable could result in damage to your computer and monitor.

- 1. Turn off the computer and disconnect the AC adapter from it.
- 2. Plug the monitor cable in the external monitor port on the back of the computer.

The external monitor port has a trapezoidal cross-section.

(1) Insert the connector straight into the external monitor port with the right side up, and (2) secure it with the screws on both sides of the connector.



(Your computer or situation may not look exactly like this illustration.)

3. Connect the other end of the cable to the CRT monitor.

For the way of connecting the cable to your monitor, refer to its manual.

- 4. Plug the power cable of the CRT monitor in a wall outlet, and then turn on the monitor.
- Connect the AC adapter to your computer, and turn on the computer.
   After that, switch from the LCD monitor to the external CRT monitor if you like.

If the Add New Hardware Wizard appears after you have connected the external display, perform these steps.

 Some external monitors come with a CD or floppy disk containing files necessary for using them. If a CD or floppy disk is included with your monitor, install all necessary files according to the instructions in your monitor manual.

### **Critical Point-**

 Images may be displayed on both the LCD screen of your computer and the external monitor connected. If you like, you can switch to the monitor you want to use.

# SECTION

3

This section explains what to do when trouble occurs with this computer and when messages are displayed. Read this section as the necessity arises.



# 1. When This Happens

When you are having trouble with this computer, there is something you think is strange, or there is something you want to do, but do not know how. This section is divided into related items.

# The power does not come on.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the AC adaptor connected?	When using this computer for the first time after purchase, the battery is not yet charged, so you must connect the AC adaptor and switch on the main switch.
Is the main switch switched on?	If the main switch is not switched on, the power will not come on even if the SUS/RES switch is pressed.
Is the battery charged?	If a beep is heard when the main switch is turned on, then the battery is running low (LOW BATTERY). Connect the AC adaptor.
Has the computer been left unused for a long time?	When using the computer for the first time after leaving it unused for a long time, connect the AC adaptor and switch on the main switch to switch on the power.

Nothing displayed on the LCD panel	
Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is anything displayed on the status indicator LCD?	Connect the AC adaptor and switch on the main switch.
Is @ displayed on the LCD panel?	Displayed     Adjust the brightness and darkness with the brightness and contrast controls.      Flashing     Press the SUS/RES switch to put the computer into operating mode.      When the icon is off on the status indicator LCD.     When the computer runs by the battery power, check the battery status if it is sufficiently charged for operation or not. If it is not charged, connect the AC adaptor and charge it. If you are already using this computer with the AC adaptor connected, check that it is correctly plugged into the power socket and into the computer.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Have you been pressing any of the keys?	On this computer, if the power management functions are set and no key is pressed for a certain period of time, the CPU stops and the LCD panel backlight goes out. (In this state, pressing any key lights up the backlight again.) If the computer stops too frequently, change the BIOS setup settings.
Is it set to output to the CRT?	Switch over to the LCD display with the [Fn] + [F10] keys.

# LCD panel hard to read.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Did you adjust the brightness?	Adjust the luminance of the LCD's backlight with the [Fn] + [F6] keys or [Fn] + [F7] keys on the keyboard.

# Battery is not charged.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the AC adaptor connected?	Check that the AC adaptor is correctly plugged into the power socket and into the computer.
Is the battery overheated (The $\longrightarrow$ on the LCD display flashes.)?	If the ambient temperature is high and the battery temperature becomes too high during use, the battery protection function may be triggered to stop the charging.
Is the computer too cold (The — on the LCD display flashes.)?	If the battery temperature falls too low, the battery protection function may be triggered to stop the charging.
Was the charging stopped midway?	If you use the computer and disconnect the AC adaptor between the start of charging and the time the — LCD turns off, the battery will not become fully charged, Once you start charging do not remove the AC adapter until the — LCD turns off.

# The remaining battery charge indicator does not stop flashing.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the battery connected correctly?	Check that the battery is connected correctly. If it is connected correctly, there is an abnormality in the battery pack, so replace the battery pack.
Is the battery low?	Attach the AC adaptor and charge the battery.

# Floppy disk or LS-120 disk can not be used.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the floppy disk loaded into the floppy disk drive correctly?	Insert the floppy disk with its label facing up, into the drive shutter and keep inserting firmly until you hear a clicking sound.
Is the floppy disk formatted?	New floppy disks can not be used until they are formatted (initialized). Format the floppy disk.
Is the floppy disk unit securely installed?	Firmly install the floppy disk drive unit, port replicater or LS-120 disk unit.
Are both items of "Floppy disk A" and "Floppy controller" of the BIOS Setup menu set properly?	In the case a floppy disk is used, select "1.44/1.2MB 3.5" for the item "Floppy disk A" and "Use" for the item "Floppy controller".
Is "Administrator only" selected for the item "Floppy disk access" of the BIOS Setup menu?	In the case a floppy disk is used, select "Accessible at any time" for this item. When a super disk is used, accessibility cannot be controlled by this item.
Is the floppy disk write inhibited?	Set the write protect tab on the floppy disk to the write enable position.
Does it work with a different floppy disk?	If it works with a different floppy disk then the problem floppy disk may be damaged.

# No sound or minimal sound from speaker.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the volume control correctly adjusted?	Turn the volume control to adjust the volume to a proper level. If volume adjustment with the volume control results in failure, check to see if the sound driver is correctly installed.

# Can not record from Mic or Line In jack.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the volume adjusted properly?	Turn the volume control to obtain the correct volume. If the line jack is connected to the sound source, then check that connection. If recording still results in failure after the above-mentioned operation and check, activate the item "Recording" of the "Volume Control" and again adjust the volume with it.

# LCD panel does not close.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is something caught in the LCD panel?	Forcing the LCD panel closed can damage it. Check for something caught in the LCD panel. Also, a metal object such as a paper clip can cause a breakdown if it gets caught in between the keys.

# The power management function is not executed.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is Power Savings set to off in the BIOS setup?	Reset the BIOS setup.

# Data cannot be read from the CD-ROM drive.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the CD-ROM correctly set?	Set the CD-ROM correctly with its label facing upwards.
Is there any dirt, condensation or water on the CD-ROM?	Wipe it from the center outwards with a dry, soft cloth.
Is the CD-ROM scratched or extremely warped?	Replace the CD-ROM.
Are you using a non-standard CD-ROM?	Use a CD-ROM which conforms to the standards.
Is the CD-ROM drive unit securely installed?	Securely install the CD-ROM drive unit.

# ■ The CD cannot be ejected from the CD-ROM.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is it in operating mode?	The CD can only be ejected when the personal computer main unit is in operating mode because its CD- ROM drive has an electronic lock. Check that the personal computer main unit is in operating mode and press the EJECT button. If for some reason the CD tray does not come out even when you press the EJECT button, insert a clip or something into the hole to the right of the EJECT button and pull the tray out.  If the tray doesn't still come out, click the CD-ROM icon in the "My Computer" window with the right button of the mouse and then click "EJECT".

# Super disk cannot be ejected.

Checkpoint	Cause and Solution
Is the computer in operation?	Since the super disk drive secures the super disk by the electronic lock, the disk can be ejected only when the computer is in the operation status.  If the super disk cannot be ejected for some reason, insert a thin linear wire such as a straightened paper clip or the like into the emergency disk ejecting hole and push it into the depth. The disk will be resultingly ejected from the drive.



# 2. Maintenance of your Computer

# **⚠** WARNING-



# **ELECTRIC SHOCK**

To avoid electric shock and injury, always perform these steps before proceeding to maintenance.

- Turn off the computer, disconnect the AC adapter and remove the battery from it.
- Turn off all peripherals connected, including the printer, and disconnect them from the computer.

If the computer is soiled, wipe it gently with a soft dry cloth.

If the computer is badly soiled, wipe it with a cloth slightly dampened with water or detergent diluted with water. After using detergent, wipe remaining detergent off with a cloth slightly dampened with water. When wiping the computer, be extremely careful to prevent water from getting in it. Never use any volatile chemical such as thinner or benzene, nor any cloth containing chemicals.

If you use your Fujitsu LifeBook notebook carefully, you will increase its life and reliability. This section provides some tips for looking after the notebook and its devices.

# Caution:

Electrical equipment may be hazardous if misused. Operations of this product or similar products, must always be supervised by an adult. Do not allow children access to the interior of any electrical products and do not permit them to handle any cables.

# LIFEBOOK NOTEBOOK

# Caring for your LifeBook Notebook

- Your LifeBook notebook is a durable but sensitive electronic device. Treat it with care.
- Make a habit of transporting it in a suitable carrying case.
- Do not attempt to service the computer yourself. Always follow installation instructions closely.
- Keep it away from food and beverages.
- · If you accidentally spill liquid on your notebook:
  - 1. Turn it off.
  - 2. Position it so that the liquid can run out.
  - 3. Let it dry out for 24 hours, or longer if needed.
  - 4. If your notebook will not boot after it has dried out, call your support representative.
- Do not use your LifeBook notebook in a wet environment (near a bathtub, swimming pool).
- Always use the AC adapter and batteries that are approved for your notebook.
- Avoid exposure to sand, dust and other environmental hazards.
- Do not expose your LifeBook notebook to direct sunlight for long periods of time as temperatures above 140°F (60°C) may damage your notebook.
- · Keep the covers closed on the connectors and slots when they are not in use.
- · Do not put heavy or sharp objects on the computer.

- If you are carrying your LifeBook notebook in a briefcase, or any other carrying case, make sure
  that there are no objects in the case pressing on the lid.
- · Do not drop your LifeBook notebook.
- Do not touch the screen with any sharp objects.

# Cleaning your LifeBook Notebook

- Always disconnect the power plug. (Pull the plug, not the cord.)
- · Clean your LifeBook notebook with a damp, lint-free cloth. Do not use abrasives or solvents.
- Use a soft cloth to remove dust from the screen. Never use glass cleaners.

# Storing your LifeBook Notebook

- If storing your notebook for a month or longer, turn your LifeBook notebook off and remove all Lithium lon batteries.
- Store your LifeBook notebook and batteries separately. If you store your notebook with a battery
  installed, the battery will discharge, and battery life will be reduced. In addition, a faulty battery
  might damage your notebook.
- Store your LifeBook notebook in a cool, dry location. Temperatures should remain between 25°C (13°F) and 60°C (140°F).

## Travelling with your LifeBook Notebook

- Do not transport your LifeBook notebook while it is turned on.
- · Do not check your LifeBook notebook as baggage. Carry it with you.
- Always bring your System Recovery CD that came with your LifeBook notebook when you
  travel. If you experience system software problems while travelling you may need it to correct
  any problems.
- Never put your LifeBook notebook through a metal detector. Have your notebook hand-inspected
  by security personnel. You can, however, put your LifeBook notebook through a properly tuned
  X-ray machine. To avoid problems, place your notebook close to the entrance of the machine
  and remove it as soon as possible or have your notebook hand-inspected by security personnel.
  Security officials may require you to turn your notebook On. Make sure you have a charged
  battery on hand.
- When travelling with the hard drive removed, wrap the drive in a non-conducting materials (cloth or paper). If you have the drive checked by hand, be ready to install the drive if needed. Never put your hard drive through a metal detector. Have your hard drive hand-inspected by security personnel. You can however, put your hard drive through a properly tuned X-ray machine.
- Take the necessary plug adapters if you're travelling overseas. Check the following diagram to determine which plug adapter you'll need or ask your travel agent.

# **BATTERIES**

## Caring for your Batteries

- · Always handle batteries carefully.
- Do not short-circuit the battery terminals (that is, do not touch both terminals with a metal object). Do not carry lose batteries in a pocket or purse where they may mix with coins, keys, or other metal objects. Doing so may cause an explosion or fire.
- Do not drop, puncture, disassemble, mutilate or incinerate the battery.
- · Recharge batteries only as described in this manual and only in ventilated areas.
- Do not leave batteries in hot locations for more than a day or two. Intense heat can shorten battery life.
- Do not leave a battery in storage for longer than 6 months without recharging it.

## **Increasing Battery Life**

- Power your LifeBook notebook through the AC or optional auto/airline adapater whenever possible.
- If your LifeBook notebook is running on battery power all day, connect it to the AC adapater overnight to recharge the battery.
- · Keep brightness to the lowest level comfortable.
- · Set the power management for maximum battery life.
- Put your LifeBook notebook in Suspend mode when it is turned on and you are not actually using it.

- · Limit your DVD/CD-RW/CD-ROM access.
- · Disable the Windows CD automatic insertion function.
- · Always use fully charged batteries.
- · Eject PCMCIA cards when not in use.

# FLOPPY DISKS AND DRIVES

# Caring for your Floppy Disks

- Avoid using the floppy disks in damp and dusty locations.
- · Never store a floppy disk near a magnet or magnetic field.
- Do not use a pencil or an eraser on a disk or disk label.
- Avoid storing the floppy disks in extremely hot or cold locations, or in locations subject to severe temperature changes. Store at temperatures between 50°F (10°C) and 125°F (52°C)
- · Do not touch the exposed part of the disk behind the metal shutter.

# Caring for your Floppy Disk Drive

- To clean, wipe the floppy disk drive clean with a dry soft cloth, or with a soft cloth dampened with water or a solution of neutral detergent. Never use benzene, paint thinner or other volatile material.
- Avoid storing the floppy disk drive in extremely hot or cold locations, or in locations subject to severe temperature changes. Store at temperatures between 50°F (10°C) and 125°F (52°C)
- · Keep the floppy disk drive out of direct sunlight and away from hating equipment.
- Avoid storing the floppy disk drive in locations subject to shock and vibration.
- Never use the floppy disk drive with any liquid, metal, or other foreign matter inside the floppy disk drive or disk.
- · Never disassemble or dismantle your floppy disk drive.

# DVD/CD-RW/CDs

# Caring for your DVD/CD-RW/CDs

- DVD/CD-RW/CDs are precision devices and will function reliably if given reasonable care.
- · Always store your DVD/CD-RW/CDs in its case when it is not in use.
- Always handle DVD/CD-RW/CDs by the edges and avoid touching the surface.
- Avoid storing any DVD/CD-RW/CDs in extreme temperatures.
- Do not bend DVD/CD-RW/CDs or set heavy objects on them.
- · Do not spill liquids on DVD/CD-RW/CDs.
- Do not scratch DVD/CD-RW/CDs.
- Do not put a label on DVD/CD-RW/CDs.
- Do not get dust on DVD/CD-RW/CDs.
- · Never write on the label surface with a ballpoint pen or pencil. Always use a felt pen.

- If a DVD/CD-RW/CD is subjected to a sudden change in temperature, cold to warm condensation
  may form on the surface. Wipe the moisture off with a clean, soft, lint free cloth and let it dry at
  room temperature, DO NOT use a hair dryer or heater to dry DVD/CD-RW/CDs.
- If a DVD/CD-RW/CD is dirty, use only a DVD/CD-RW/CD cleaner or wipe it with a clean, soft, lint free cloth starting from the inner edge and wiping to the outer edge.

# Caring for your DVD/CD-RW/CD-ROM Drive

Your DVD/CD-RW/CD-ROM drive is durable but you must treat it with care. Please pay attention to the following points:

- The drive rotates the compact disk at a very high speed. Do not carry it around or subject it to shock or vibration with the power on.
- Avoid using or storing the drive where it will be exposed to extreme temperatures.
- · Avoid using or storing the drive where it is damp or dusty.
- · Avoid using or storing the drive near magnets or devices that generate strong magnetic fields.
- Avoid using or storing the drive where it will be subjected to shock or vibration.
- Do not disassemble or dismantle the DVD/CD-RW/D-ROM drive.

# Caring for your PC Cards

PC Cards are durable, but you must treat them with care. The documentation supplied with your PC Card will provide specific information, but you should pay attention to the following points:

- To keep out dust and dirt, store PC Cards in their protective sleeves when they are not installed in your notebook.
- Avoid prolonged exposure to direct sunlight or excessive heat.
- · Keep the cards dry.
- Do not flex or bend the cards, and do not place heavy objects on top of them.
- · Do not force cards into the slot.
- Avoid dropping cards, or subjecting them to excessive vibration.

# 3. Glossary

# **AC Adapter**

A device which converts the AC voltage from a wall outlet to the DC voltage needed to power your notebook.

# **Active-Matrix Display**

A type of technology for making flat-panel displays which has a transistor or similar device for every pixel on the screen.

#### AdHoc

A name of a wireless LAN configuration.

It is a type of communication using wireless cards only.

Another type of communication is called Infrastructure (using a wireless card and an access point).

# **ADSL**

Asymmetric Digital Subscriber Line Technology for transporting high bit-rate services over ordinary phone lines.

## **APM**

Advanced Power Management.

# Auto/Airline Adapter

A device which converts the DC voltage from an automobile cigarette lighter or aircraft DC power outlet to the DC voltage needed to power your notebook.

## **BIOS**

Basic Input-Output System. A program and set of default parameters stored in ROM which tests and operates your notebook when you turn it on until it loads your installed operating system from disk. Information from the BIOS is transferred to the installed operating system to provide it with information on the configuration and status of the hardware.

#### Bit

An abbreviation for binary digit. A single piece of information which is either a one (1) or a zero (0).

# bps

An abbreviation for bits per second. Used to describe data transfer rates.

#### Boot

To start-up a computer and load its operating system from disk, ROM or other storage media into RAM.

#### Bus

An electrical circuit which passes data between the CPU and the sub-assemblies inside your notebook.

#### Byte

8 bits of parallel binary information.

# **Cache Memory**

A block of memory built into the micro-processor which ins much faster to access than your system RAM and used in specially structured ways to make your overall data handling tine faster.

#### CardBus

A faster, 32-bit version of the PC Card interface which offers performance similar to the 32-bit PCI architecture.

#### CD-ROM

Compact disc read only memory. This is a form of digital data storage which is read optically with a laser rather than a magnetic head. A typical CD-ROM can contain about 600MB of data and is not subject to be crashing into the surface and destroying the data when there is a failure nor to wear from reading.

# Channel

A radio frequency band used for communication between wireless cards and access points.

#### **CMOS RAM**

Complementary metal oxide semiconductor random access memory. This is a technology for manufacturing random access memory which requies very low level power to operate.

#### **COMM Port**

Abbreviation for communication port. This is your serial interface connection.

#### Command

An instruction which you give your operating system. Example: run a particular application or format a floppy disk.

# Configuration

The combination of hardware and software that make up your system and how it is allocated for use.

# **CRT**

Cathode Ray Tube. A display device which uses a beam of electronic particles striking a luminescent screen. It produces a visual image by varying the position and intensity of the beam.

#### Data

The information a system stores and processes.

## DC

Direct current. A voltage or current that does not fluctuate periodically with time.

## **Default Value**

A pre programmed value to be used if you fail to set your own.

# **DHCP**

Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol A protocol used to automatically acquire parameters required for the communication, such as IP address.

The sender of IP address is called a DHCP server, and the receiver is called a DHCP client.

#### DIMM

Dual-in-line memory module.

#### Disk

A spinning platter of magnetic data storage media. If the platter is very stiff it is a hard drive, if it is highly flexible it is a floppy disk, if it is a floppy disk in a hard housing with a shutter it is commonly called diskette.

#### **Disk Drive**

The hardware which spins the disk and has the heads and control circuitry for reading and writing the data on the disk.

# **Diskette**

A floppy disk in a hard housing with a shutter.

#### DMA

Direct Memory Access. Special circuitry for memory to memory transfer of data which do not require CPU action.

#### DMI

Desktop Management Interface. A standard that provides PC management applications with a common method of locally or remotely querying and configuring PC computer systems hardware and software components, and peripherals.

# DNS

# **Domain Name System**

A function to control the association between the IP address and the name assigned to the computer. If you do not know the IP address but if you know the computer name, you can still communicate to that computer.

#### DOS

Disk Operating System (MS-DOS is a Microsoft Disk Operating System).

## Driver

A computer program which converts application and operating system commands to external devices into the exact from required by a specific brand and model of device in order to produce the desired results from that particular equipment.

#### **ECP**

Extended Capability Port. A set of standards for high speed data communication and interconnection between electronic devices.

# **Encryption Key (Network Key)**

Key information used to encode data for data transfer.

This device uses the same encryption key to encode and decode the data, and the identical encryption key is required between the sender and receiver.

#### **ESD**

Electro-Static Discharge. The sudden discharge of electricity form a static charge which has built-up slowly. Example: the shock you get from a doorknob on a dry day or the sparks you get form brushing hair on a dry day.

# **Extended Memory**

All memory more than the 640KB recognized by MS-DOS as system memory.

# **FCC**

Federal Communication Commission.

# Floppy Disk

A spinning platter of magnetic data storage media which is highly flexible.

#### GB

Gigabyte.

#### Hard drive

A spinning platter of magnetic data storage media where the platter is very stiff.

#### Hexadecimal

A decimal notation for the value of a 4 bit binary number. (0-9, A, B, C, D, E, F) Example: 2F in hexadecimal = 00101111 = 47 in decimal.

# I/O

Input/Output. Data entering and leaving your notebook in electronic form.

#### I/O Port

The connector and associated control circuits for data entering and leaving your notebook in electronic form

#### IDE

Intelligent Drive Electronics. A type of control interface for a hard drive which is inside the hard drive unit.

# IEEE 802.11b

The U.S. IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers) promotes standardization of LAN, and its standards committee (IEEE 802.11) has promoted 1-Mbps and 2-Mbps wireless LAN. Currently, another standards committee (IEEE 802.11b) is working for standardization of the faster 11-Mbps wireless Lan.

#### Infrared

Light just beyond the red portion of the visible light spectrum which is invisible to humans.

#### Infrastructure

A name of a wireless LAN configuration. This type of communication uses an access point. Another type of communication is called AdHoc.

## **IP Address**

An address used for computers to communicate in the TCP/IP environment.

Current IPv4 (version 4) uses four values in the range between 1 and 255. (Example: 192.168.100.123).

There are two types of IP address: global address and private address.

The global address is an only address in the world.

A private address is an only address in the closed network.

#### IR

An abbreviation for infrared.

#### IrDA

Infrared Data Association. An organization which produces standards for communication using infrared as the carrier.

#### IRQ

Interrupt Request. An acronym for the hardware signal to the CPU that an external event has occurred which needs to be processed.

#### KB

Kilobyte.

# LAN

Local Area Network. An interconnection of computers and peripherals within a single limited geographic location which can pass programs and data amongst themselves.

### LAN

# **Local Area Network**

A connection of computers within a relatively limited area, such as the same floor, or the same building.

## LCD

Liquid Crystal Display. A type of display which makes images by controlling the orientation of crystals in a crystalline liquid.

## Lithium ion Battery

A type of rechargeable battery which has a high power-time life for its size and is not subject to the memory effect as Nickel Cadmium batteries.

# **LPT Port**

Line Printer Port. A way of referring to parallel interface ports because historically line printers were the first and latter the most common device connected to parallel ports.

#### MAC Address

# **Media Access Control Address**

A unique physical address of a network card.

For Ethernet, the first three bytes are used as the vendor code, controlled and assigned by IEEE. The remaining three bytes are controlled by each vendor (preventing overlap), therefore, every Ethernet card is given a unique physical address in the world, being assigned with a different address from other cards. For Ethernet, frames are sent and received based on this address.

# MB

Megabyte.

# Megahertz

1,000,000 cycles per second.

# Memory

A repository for data and applications which is readily accessible to your notebook CPU.

#### MHz

Megahertz.

#### MIDI

Musical Instrument Digital Interface. A standard communication protocol for exchange of information between computers and sound producers such as synthesizers.

#### Modem

A contraction for MOdulator-DEModulator. The equipment which connects a computer or other data terminal to a communication line.

#### Monaural

A system using one channel to process sound form all sources.

## MPU-401

A standard for MIDI interfaces and connectors.

# MTU

## **Maximum Transmission Unit**

The maximum data size that can be transferred at a time through the Internet or other networks. You can set a smaller MTU size to obtain successful communication, if you have difficulty transferring data due to the fact that the maximum size is too large.

# NTSC

National TV Standards Commission. The standard for TV broadcast and reception for the USA.

# **Operating System**

A group of control programs that convert application commands, including driver programs, into the exact form required by a specific brand and model of microprocessor in order to produce the desired results from that particular equipment.

## **Parallel Port**

A connection to another device through which data is transferred as a block of bits simultaneously with a wire for each bit in the block and with other wires only for control of the device not for transfer of data.

#### **Partition**

A block of space on a hard drive which is set aside and made to appear to the operating system as if it were a separate disk, and addressed by the operating system accordingly.

#### **PCMCIA**

PCMCIA is trademark of the Personal Computer Memory Card International Association. The Personal Computer Memory Card International Association is an organization that sets standards for add-in cards for personal computers.

# **Peripheral Device**

A piece or equipment which performs a specific function associated with but not integral to a computer. Examples: a printer, a mode, a CD-ROM.

# Pitch (keyboard)

The distance between the centers of the letter keys of a keyboard.

#### Pixel

The smallest element of a display, a dot of color on your display screen. The more pixels screen. The more pixels per area the clearer your image will appear.

#### **POST**

Power On Self Test. A program which part of the BIOS which checks the configuration and operating condition of your hardware whenever power is applied to your notebook. Status and error messages may be displayed before the operating system is loaded. If the self test detects failures that are so serious that operation can not continue, the operating system will not be loaded.

#### **PPPoE**

# Point to Point Protocol over Ethernet

A protocol for Ethernet, using a Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP), which is used for connection on the phone line.

## **Program**

An integrated set of coded commands to your computers telling your hardware what to do and how and when to do it.

#### **Protocol**

Procedures and rules use to send and receive data between computers.

- Method of sending and receiving data
- Process used to handle communication errors

Conditions required for communication are organized in procedures for correct transfer of information.

## PS/2

An IBM series of personal computers which established a number of standards for connecting external devices such as keyboards and monitors.

#### RAM

Random Access Memory. A hardware component of your notebook that holds binary information (both program and data) as long as it has the proper power applied to it.

#### **RAM Module**

A printed circuit card with memory and associated circuitry which allows the user to add additional memory to the computer without special tools.

## Reset

The act of reloading the operating system. A reset erases all information stored in RAM.

#### Restart

See Reset.

#### Resume

To proceed after interruption. In your notebook this refers to returning to active operation after having been in one of the suspension states.

# **ROM**

Read Only Memory. A form of memory in which information is stored by physically altering the material. Data stored in this way can not be changed by your notebook and does not require power to maintain it.

## **SDRAM**

Synchronous Dynamic Random Access Memory.

#### Serial Port

A connection to another device through which data is transferred one bit at a time on a single wire with any other wires only for control of the device not for transfer of data.

## Shadow RAM

A technique of copying data or applications stored in ROM (Read Only Memory) into RAM (Random Access Memory) for access during actual operation. RAM is much faster to access than ROM, however ROM contents are not lost when power is removed. Shadowing allows permanently stored information to be rapidly accessed.

# **SMART**

Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology (SMART) is an emerging technology that provides near-term failure predictions for hard drives. When SMART is enabled the hard drive monitors predetermined drive attributes that are susceptible to degradation over time. If a failure is likely to occur. SMART makes a status report available so that the LifeBook can prompt the user to back up the data on the drive. Naturally not all failures are predictable. SMART predictability is limited to those attributes which the drive can self-monitor. In those cases where SMART can give advance warning, a considerable amount of precious data can be saved.

#### SRAM

Static random access memory. A specific technology of making RAM which does not require periodic data refreshing.

## **SSID**

#### Service Set Identifier

Specifies which network you are joining. Some systems allow you to specify any SSID as an option so you can join any network.

## **Status Indicator**

A display which reports the condition of some portion of your hardware. On your notebook this is an LCD screen just above the keyboard.

# Stereo (audio)

A system using two channels to process sound from two different sources.

# Stroke (keyboard)

The amount of travel of a key when it is pressed from resting to fully depressed.

# Suspend

To make inoperative for a period of time. Your notebook uses various suspension states to reduce power consumption and prolong the charge of your battery.

## **SVGA**

Super VGA.

#### S-Video

Super Video. A component video system for driving a TV or computer monitor.

# System Clock

An oscillator of fixed precise frequency which synchronizes the operation of the system and is counted to provide time of day and date.

#### TCP/IP

Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol A standard Internet protocol that is most widely used

# **TFT**

Thin Film Transistor - A technology for flat display panels which uses a thin film matrix of transistors to control each pixel of the display screen individually.

# UL

Underwriters Laboratories - An independent organization that tests and certifies the electrical safety of devices.

#### **VGA**

Video Graphics Array. A video display standard originally introduced by IBM with the PS/2 series of personal computers.

## **VRAM**

Video Random Access Memory. A memory dedicated to video display data and control.

# WFM

Wired for Management is Intel's broad-based initiative to reduce the total cost of ownership (TCO) of business computing without sacrificing power and flexibility.

# Wi-Fi Compatible

Wi-Fi (Wireless Fidelity) Identifies that the product has passed the interoperability test, supplied by the WECA (Wireless Ethernet Compatibility Alliance), which guarantees the interoperability of wireless IEEE 802.11 LAN products. For more information on the Wi-Fi standard, go to the WECA website at: www.wirelessethernet.com.

#### Write Protect

Prevent alteration of the binary state of all bits in a storage media. Example: all information on a device such as a floppy diskette; a block of space in a storage media such as partition of a hard drive; a file or directory of floppy diskette or hard drive.

# **XGA**

Extended VGA.

## Zip Drive

A 100MB read/rite removable media disk drive.

#### **Zoomed Video**

A PC Card port which allows notebook PCs to deliver full screen broadcast quality video through third party PC Cards, including TV tuners, video capture, and MPEG full-motion video.
